SITUATIONAL AWARENESS

- Detroit Mayor Mike Duggan has announced that the City of Detroit will be the first in the country to utilize a new testing method that can provide results in 15 minutes, even if the patient is not yet showing symptoms. These test kits will be reserved and utilized for City of Detroit Police Officers, first responders, and bus drivers.
- A 6-week-old infant in Connecticut has become the youngest victim of COVID-19.
- After three (3) Amazon workers at the Romulus warehouse tested positive for COVID-19, Amazon workers protested work conditions due to social distancing guidelines not always being followed. Additionally, workers protested against the sale of non-essential items, thereby temporarily decreasing staffing to allow for social distancing.
- Kroger has announced that it will provide a temporary "Hero Bonus" to its frontline workers with an increase of \$2/hour.
- A North Korean senior official has stated that North Korea remains free of COVID-19 cases.
- Today, the total amount of confirmed worldwide cases is expected to exceed 1 million and the total amount of reported worldwide deaths will exceed 50,000.
- The number of confirmed cases in New York (83,901) has now surpassed China (81,589).
- Los Angeles Mayor Eric Garcetti has stressed the importance of staying home and only going out to perform essential activities such as grocery shopping. The Mayor also advised its citizens to wear a home-made mask or a non-medical face covering when performing those essential activities.

- Fear and worry about your own health and the health of your loved ones
- Changes in sleep or eating patterns
- Difficulty sleeping or concentrating
- Worsening of chronic health problems
- Increased use of alcohol, tobacco, or other drugs
