SITUATIONAL AWARENESS

- Wayne County is currently within HIGH Covid-19 community levels.
- Wayne County dashboard may be found at www.waynecounty.com/COVID19dashboard for latest community updates.
- Wash your hands often. Use soap and water for at least 20 seconds. If you do not have soap and water, use hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol. —CDC
- Antigen tests are effective and quick screening tests, meaning they are good detecting those that are at
 highest risk at transmitting the virus to others, even for those who do not appear sick (i.e.,
 asymptomatic). —CDC
- Antigen tests result in 10-15 minutes and do not need to be sent to a lab to get the results. o This means
 actions can be taken sooner regarding isolation and contact tracing. o They are helpful in settings where
 a large number of people need to get tested quickly and/or regularly, and in community settings. —CDC
- If you test positive for COVID-19 or if you have been exposed it is important that you immediately take
 steps to get the care you need and avoid giving COVID-19 to people around you -Contagious: You can be
 contagious two days before symptoms appear (or two days before test date if positive and no
 symptoms) through the end of the isolation period. —MDHHS
- MDHHS continues to recommend the use of layered mitigation strategies for Michiganders, including vaccination, masks, testing, and isolation/quarantine as needed. —MDHHS
- As a reminder: Coronavirus disease (COVID-19) is an infectious disease caused by the SARS-CoV-2 virus.
 Most people infected with the virus will experience mild to moderate respiratory illness and recover
 without requiring special treatment. Anyone can get sick with COVID-19 and become seriously ill and die
 at any age. The best way to prevent and slow down transmission is to be well informed about the
 disease and how the virus spreads. The virus can spread from an infected person's mouth or nose in
 small liquid particles when they cough, sneeze, speak, sing or breathe. These particles range from larger
 respiratory droplets to smaller aerosols. —WHO
- Take whatever vaccine is made available to you first, even if you have already had COVID-19. It is
 important to be vaccinated as soon as possible once it's your turn and not wait. It is safe and effective to
 mix-and-match different COVID-19 vaccines —WHO
